

Be a good dog owner in Fort St. John

The Fort St. John Animal Control Bylaw No. 2556, 2021 outlines the rules, regulations and responsibilities for responsible pet ownership.

Licensing

- All dogs over the age of three months must be licensed
- Dog licenses can be conveniently acquired online via Docupet. To license your dog, please visit www.fortstjohn.DocuPet.com. Alternatively, you can also stop by City Hall, where reception will assist you in the Docupet licensing process.

Leashing and running-at-large

- Dogs must not be allowed to run at large
- Dogs must be leashed when in public (except for designated off-leash areas)
- Dog on any school ground, playground, park or sports field where Dogs are expressly prohibited

Nuisance dogs

 Keep your dog from being a nuisance (barking, chasing people/bikes/cars/other animals)

#1 reason to license your dogs

A licence tag helps our Bylaw Department or the local animal shelter connect you with your lost dog! Statistically, dogs that are licensed spend less time in the shelter before returning to their families.

Pick up after your dog

 Pick up and dispose of dog waste from any public or private property

Number of dogs

You are allowed to have a maximum of three (3) dogs per household

Responsible guardianship

- Do not let your dog bite
- Owners must provide food and water, and a clean, sanitary shelter for their dog
- Ensure your dog does not cause damage to property or other animals

Aggressive and biting dogs

- Aggressive Dogs, defined under Section 49 of the Community Charter as having displayed behaviour such as aggressively pursuing growling, snarling or lunging, or potential to injure a person or animal
- A Biting Dog has bitten a person or another animal
- These terms allow bylaw officers to respond appropriately to individual situations

A dog's behaviour is the responsibility of the owner.



The Animal Control Bylaw also outlines regulations around prohibited animals (such as exotic animals), aggressive & biting dogs, standards of basic care, enforcement and seizures.
